CHRISTOPH DRAEGER: THE END OF THE REMAKE

New York-based Christoph Draeger's work revels in destruction. His perversely pleasurable videos and installations - usually simulacra of both real and fictional disasters - engage with watching things collapse, collide, explode and shatter. This love of entropy extends to a fascination with the late 1960s, when, according to Draeger, revolutionary optimism gave way to 'the dystopia of its selfdestruction'. On show for the first time in its entirety this month at Roebling Hall in New York is a trilogy of films entitled The End of the Remake, which explore the period and its annihilation. Included are My Generation (This is where it all ends) (2007), a simulation of the Who's guitar-smashing antics, and Blow Up, Stroll On (2007), a careful restaging of a scene from Michelangelo Antonioni's Blow-Up (1966) in which a rocker destroys his guitar before a bored audience. The crowning piece is Hippie Movie (2008), a documentary-style work in which footage from the period is reenacted by residents of Warsaw, for whom, ironically, the hippie movement never happened at all.
